
BAPTISMS

MEDITATION

Sunday, May 4, 2025

Third Sunday of Easter

You have filled Jerusalem with your teaching. (Acts 5:28)

The Acts of the Apostles contains such amazing stories that it can sometimes seem like we are reading a work of fiction. But that's just not the case. Take today's first reading, for example. There really were men and women who, in the face of severe persecution, kept filling Jerusalem with the good news. Peter and the apostles really were questioned, tortured, and imprisoned. But they didn't back down. Instead, they replied, "We must obey God rather than men" (Acts 5:29).

It might be hard to relate to such boldness. So let's imagine how, in our own day and age, we can "fill" the places we inhabit with the good news of Jesus Christ.

Think about a place that involves some waiting. Maybe it's the school pickup line or a subway ride or the time between classes. Now picture those places as your own "Jerusalem" (Acts 5:28). Imagine the good news of the saving love and mercy of God bubbling up inside of you, filling you with life and joy. You feel as if you can't contain it. So instead of scrolling on your phone, you hold your head high, your smile widens, and you look around for someone to share it with.

As you keep this posture of openness and connection to the joy of the gospel, you will naturally start getting to know some of the people who are also waiting with you. That will lead to new friendships. After a while, the crossing guard might tell you about her upcoming surgery, opening up a space for you to offer to pray for her. Some of your classmates might appreciate your openness, and you could strike up a conversation about your faith. Or maybe you end up engaging with a fellow subway passenger.

This is you, filling your own "Jerusalem" with the gospel!

IN MEMORIAM

A Reflection on Pope Francis on Devotion to Mary

Pope Francis stated that, "True devotion to Mary always 'points to Jesus.'" He said, "The Mother of God is an instrument of the Holy Spirit in his work of sanctification. Mary is the one who said 'yes' to God and, with her example and by her intercession, pushes us to say 'yes' to him too."

As "the first disciple and figure of the Church," the Holy Father hopes that Christians today will allow Mary to "see Jesus," "open our hearts" to him, and "arise in haste" to help others in need.

Describing Mary, Pope Francis echoed the words of the patron of his pontificate, St. Francis of Assisi: "Daughter and handmaid of the heavenly Father, the almighty King, Mother of our most high Lord Jesus Christ, and spouse of the Holy Spirit." Pope Francis said, "The unique relationship between Mary and the Trinity could not be illustrated in simpler words."

Eternal rest grant unto Pope Francis, O Lord, And let perpetual light shine upon him. Amen.
