

MEDITATION

Sunday, October 13, 2024

Twenty-eighth Sunday in Ordinary Time

The Word of God is living and effective. (Hebrews 4:12-13)

What are you looking for when you read the Bible? Information about God? Guidance for your Life? There's another reason, and it may be the most important of all. We can read the Scriptures so that they can read us. We can experience them as the "living and effective" word of God that can expose the motives of our hearts and bring us healing and restoration (Hebrews 4:12).

Today's Gospel shows us this process in real time. A wealthy young man asks Jesus how he can be pleasing In response, Jesus gives him information and guidance by recounting the Ten Commandments.

But the man senses that something is still missing, and he tells Jesus as much. I already do all of this; why am I still unsatisfied? This fellow may not see it, but he is asking Jesus to "read" him and tell him what he sees.

"Looking at him" with great love, Jesus does just that. It's as if he holds up a mirror to the man so that he can see that he is too attached to his wealth. He tells the man that if he sells his possessions and gives to the poor, he will finally find the "treasure" he is seeking. Unfortunately, the man cannot accept what he sees, so he goes away "sad" (Mark 10:21, 22).

None of us has to "go away sad" when we experience Jesus "reading" our hearts through the Scriptures. We can remember how Jesus looked at the man and know that that's how he looks at all of us: with love! That means that you can hold fast to that love when his word uncovers that hidden "reflections and thoughts" in you (Hebrews 4:12). You can gaze into his eyes and see that he has nothing but good and hope-filled plans for you!

This is why the word of God is both living and effective. It's living because it is capable of reading our hearts. And it's effective because Jesus always speaks this word to us with love.

FEAST OF ST. FRANCIS OF ASSISI

On October 4th, we celebrated the feast of St. Francis of Assisi. Giovanni di Bernardone was born into a family of wealthy Italian merchants in 1181. Nicknamed "Francesco" by his father, he didn't care for the family business, and he used his family's wealth to indulge in fine clothes and entertainment. Francis sought honor and glory as an occasional soldier, but after a series of dreams his heart changed. He was in love, and Lady Poverty was his bride. After enduring his father's wrath, he surrendered his inheritance and started the Order of Friars Minor. He saw God everywhere and in everyone, and with that love he served the sick and lepers, preached, wrote hymns, made converts, and was graced with the stigmata before dying peacefully at the age of only 44.

Before he started the order, St. Francis was praying and heard, "Go, Francis, and repair my house, which as you see is falling into ruin." He took it to mean the church building where he was praying but he soon realized it was the Church itself.
