

MEDITATION

September 10, 2023

The Twenty Third Sunday In Ordinary Time

Whatever you bind on earth shall be bound in heaven, and whatever you loose on earth shall be loosed in heaven. (*Matthew* 18:18)

Jesus' words sound familiar, don't they? That's because two Sundays ago, we heard him say the same thing to Peter. Then, Jesus was giving Peter the keys to the kingdom and establishing him as leader of the Church (Matthew 16:18-19). Along with that position, he was giving Peter a specific ministry that came with a special authority and grace: the power to bind and loose. That ministry continues today in Peter's successors.

In today's Gospel, however, Jesus seems to be doing something different. He's speaking to all his disciples, and he extends this call to bind and loose to all of them—and in a way, even to us.

While most of us aren't priests who hear confessions, we are all called to forgive. Jesus wants us to understand that both our forgiveness and our failure to forgive have an effect on people. By our words and the thoughts in hearts, we can keep someone bound in condemnation or judgment. But we can also "loose" them by forgiving them. And forgiveness always releases people from the chains of guilt or shame. This means that we can help them experience the freedom that Jesus wants for them. We can continue his "ministry of reconciliation" in our corner of the world (2 Corinthians 5:18).

How amazing that Jesus trusts us to share in this sacred calling! He doesn't want anyone to remain trapped in sin or in unforgiveness. He knows the danger that sin poses to our souls. That's why he urges us to "cut off" and "throw away" anything in our lives that leads us astrav (Matthew 18:8). That's why he never stops seeking after his lost sheep (18:10-14). And that's why he calls us to forgive "seventy-seven times . . . from [our] heart" (18:22, 35). Because as we forgive people who sin against us, we won't just be freeing them. We'll Christy, Odelia Conlon, Monty Denniston, Shirley Dufresne, be "loosing" ourselves from those chains, too.

Tuesday, September 12 is the Solemnity of The Most Holy Name of Mary and the titular and patronal feast of the Society of Mary (Marists). "All to God's greater glory and to the honour of Mary, the Mother of our Lord, Jesus Christ." (Fourvière Pledge, 23rd July 1816). It takes place each year four days after the September 8 feast of the Nativity of the Blessed Mother. The feast of the Most Holy Name of the Blessed Virgin Mary originated in Spain and was approved in 1513. In 1683, Pope Innocent XI extended the feast day to the universal Church and gave it the September 12th date. The date is significant because it marks a battle victory for Christian Europe against the Muslim Turks. The Christians prayed for the intercession of Mary throughout their long and arduous campaign before achieving victory.

Although removed in 1970 from the universal calendar, Pope John Paul II reinstituted the celebration as an "optional memorial" in the Roman Missal in 2003.
